The slowdown of the last five years has affected all of us: both professionally and personally. We have to be cautious when budgeting and make sure our dollars are doing what we want them to do. SCA has weathered the tough times in pretty good shape (although our financial security depends on finding a tenant for the empty C-space in our building). Our primary source of income is Membership Dues, but we also rely on Sponsors to help keep fees for attendance at events low so more people can attend while we raise the funds necessary to keep SCA functioning for you.

One way you show your support for SCA and reach out to your fellow members is by sponsoring various activities. Sponsorship opportunities come up throughout the year and we invite you to include some of these in your budgeting for 2014.

Meeting Sponsors pay \$250 to cover guests' and speakers' meals as well as the \$100 Door Prize given away each month. At press time we have filled our schedule for 2014. Please let us know if you want first chance at Sponsoring a General Meeting in 2015.

NEWS BRIEFS

Only 74 SCA Members have not yet returned 2014 dues (25%). This figure is exactly the same as this time last year. The breakdown looks like this: only 14% of the General Contractors have not paid; 27% of the Subcontractors have not paid; Suppliers – 26% not paid; and Associates - 26% not paid. Second notices will be sent and **1.5% interest will be added to February statements**. The good news is we haven't had any members drop out so far so it looks like everyone is finding value in your membership. **PLEASE REMIT DUES BY MARCH 1 IF POSSIBLE. Remember, we now take credit card payments. If you need to make arrangements to make payments or pay later in the year, please call the office at 862-1313 and we'll work with you.**

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The Developer of the Year/Project Team of the Year committee would like some new members to help determine this year's awards. A discussion meeting will be held on Friday, March 14 to review and revise the criteria and point system used to select the annual winners. At this time we have a General Contractor, a retired General Contractor, an Architect, an Engineer and an Interior Design person on the committee. Changes to the SCA Employment Referral Service

Kathy Baer, Employment Director, has been assigned new duties in relation to maintaining the Bid Date Calendar. As a consequence, she will not be able to spend as much time on the Employment Referral Service as in the past. We have witnessed a continuous decline in the number of skilled workers looking for employment and Kathy will be cooperating with the Missouri Career Center and the Workforce Development Committee to find needed employees.

As of January 1, 2014, services will be limited to placing blind ads for members and collecting information from walk-in applicants.

Blind Ads:

1. Any SCA member may request that a blind ad be run at the member's expense;
2. SCA will accept and collect information forms for the advertised position;
3. SCA will create a file for collected forms for the specific advertisement, to be passed to the SCA member requesting the advertisement for review and selection;
 - a. No review or interview of applicants will be provided. Collection of the registration forms for "file in bulk" is the limit of the service;
 - b. SCA will not keep copies of the registration forms collected in response to a specific advertisement on file, but will keep registration forms in a locked file cabinet during collection. When finished with them, the member paying for the ad may return the forms to the SCA office for other members to use.

Walk-in Applicants:

1. Registration forms from "walk-in" applicants will be kept on file, in a locked filing cabinet, for up to 90 days for SCA member review.
2. These registration forms will be rotated out every 30 days and shredded or destroyed.
3. No interviewing, screening or sorting of registration forms will be provided.
4. SCA members must review registration forms at the SCA office, forms will not be faxed or otherwise distributed to members.

Report from DIIG

At the Development Issues Input Group (DIIG) meeting this month, there was a lengthy discussion on the EplanSystem and several things were brought to light that might be of interest to SCA members. Chris Straw and Rick Garner covered most of this at the January General Meeting, but some people may not be aware of this information.

1. The 10 day review time does **not** start when the plans are submitted. First there is what they call a Pre-screening to see if the plans are ready for review. This has been taking one to five days depending on which day submitted, who is available to review, etc. If the plans receive Pre-screening approval, then they are registered into the EplanSystem and then the 10 days start.

The City wants to get to the point that the Pre-screening takes a maximum of 2 days.

2. Once the plans are in the system, addenda cannot be submitted. They have to be submitted with the next review. As we all know, and Chris Straw acknowledged this, this can sometimes turn the review into an original review because the changes are so drastic or extensive. They won't accept addenda during a review because to many times it means starting the review over and they may only have two days or so left in their 10 day goal.

3. The city hopes in the future to get to the point that the 2nd review is done in 5 days. Of course this does not include projects that come back in with an addendum equivalent to the original drawings in size.

4. They hope to get a full-time employee whose only responsibility is to be in charge of the EplanSystem and its processing, etc., in the budget for the next fiscal year.

5. It was suggested that Chris needs additional manpower in reviewers and probably inspectors to satisfy the demand on his department.

6. The city is reviewing all of the changes and updates to the system and the need for a training session(s) for the updates and for those who missed the first training sessions.



Important Gas Survey

[Leonard Phillips, CU Manager of Natural Gas Distribution, has requested this information be included as a way to reach Builders/Contractors to let them voice their opinion on the Fuel Switching Survey.]

The American Public Gas Association (APGA) and American Gas Association have been working with the Gas Technology Institute to develop a survey targeted to builders and contractors in an effort to better understand the potential for fuel switching if new minimum efficiency standards for natural gas furnaces were to require the replacement of non-condensing equipment with condensing equipment. The data obtained as a result of this survey will be submitted to the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory and we are hopeful that it will be incorporated into their models as DOE considers going forward with new efficiency standards for natural gas furnaces. We are ready to launch the survey and request your assistance in this important effort.

The final survey is available at www.surveymonkey.com/s/FK3PDWG. January 20th is the official launch date. APGA members should begin distributing the link to your builder and contractor networks through all available channels beginning January 20th. SUMMARY OF DISCUSSION AT JANUARY 15 BOARD MEETING:

President Jerry Hackleman called the meeting to order. Sixteen Board Members were present. The Minutes, Treasurer's Report and 2013 Profit and Loss Statement were accepted. The 2014 Budget will be presented next month.

The Employment Referral Service has continued to remain static over the last several years. Changes will be made to the service (see story in this issue).

The AIA and Government Liaison Committee will meet jointly this month.

The group that used to meet with Mr. Marty met with Collin Quigley. They discussed the City's electronic plans system and updates that have been purchased to make it more efficient. The City says 80% of plans meet the 10-day frame for approval and those that don't usually exhibit problems in certain areas. The group recommends this committee merge with the AIA/Government Liaison Committee.

The MSU Liaison Committee reported the timing of some projects have been adjusted from their original stated schedule. The University is currently working on a renovation of Kentwood Hall and a computer lab renovation of Glass Hall that will be out for bid in February. These two projects will join several others coming out for bidding. The Welcome Center and Pummill Hall renovation will both be bid in April now. Some discussions with the public school district have occurred in an effort to coordinate bid dates. At the State of the State address the Governor is proposing a 5% appropriations increase to universities including MSU. The University has been making a concentrated effort to deal with closeout issues in an effort to get everyone paid in a timely manner. Assistance from the contracting community is important in this effort. Cannon Design has been selected for the new occupational therapy building and the University is currently searching for a consultant for the renovation of Sunvilla Tower.

The R-XII Liaison Committee did not meet this month due to snow days for the District. Plans for Glendale came out the day of the Board Meeting and bids are due February 4 at 6 pm and will be opened and read aloud on 2/5/2014 at 9 am. The Kickapoo HS – Package A – HVAC will be submitted on 2/10/2014 at 6 pm and opened on 2/11/2014 at 9 am. The Kickapoo Package B – Building Addition and Renovation will be submitted on 2/12/2014 at 6 pm and opened on 2/13/2014 at 9 am. Sherwood and Fremont are still in design.

Scott Miller, Wade Stinson and David Kail will be at the February Board Meeting from 11:30 to 12 to discuss CU's "lowest and best" bidding practice.

The Board discussed programs for 2014 General Meetings. Suggestions included: a panel discussion about bonds and how to get one with insurance people and accountants. If a brief overview during the May 4 lunch is not sufficient, we will organize a seminar to cover this topic, especially for subcontractors. The June General Meeting (dinner) will be a recap and comparison of the predictions made in the Construction Bidding Forecast Forum last September to what is actually happening this year.

We intend to partner with MSU and the Construction Club again this year for a meet-and-greet luncheon with a special speaker.

As we switch to Constant Contact to keep SCA members informed, there will be some changes in the format of the newsletter and other communications. Our advertising structure and pricing will be examined.

We must find a tenant for the empty C-space as soon as possible. The Board approved choosing a Realtor and getting listed.

We will design and send out a survey to all members regarding their relative sales and volume over the last three years and identifying challenges SCA can help address.

There being no further business to discuss, the meeting was declared adjourned.

A BRIEF SUMMARY OF SCA COMMITTEES:

The **Architects and Government Liaison Committee** meet together since the two committees have often discussed the same topics as they become timely. SCA members meet with representatives from the City (Building Development Services and Public Works), City Utilities, Greene County, AIA and MSPE. Architects, engineers, building contractors and subcontractors are needed for this group. This committee meets the fourth Thursday of odd-numbered months at 7:30 am at the SCA Building.

The **Chicken BBQ Committee** is responsible for planning, cooking and serving the traditional chicken dinner at Springfield Rugby Club's field west of town. The event is held the second Thursday in September. Any profit is shared with our partners, CSI and the Springfield Rugby Club. SCA's share of the proceeds goes directly into the Scholarship Endowment Fund and CSI uses theirs for scholarships, too. We would like to recruit some people with lots of mobility and access to jobsites to market the event face-to-face.

The **Developer of the Year Committee** chooses the recipient of each year's award from nomination forms submitted by members. This committee also developed the criteria to nominate and select the **Project Team of the Year** award. The awards are presented at the annual Salute to Construction Banquet in November. This group meets three or four times a year, mostly during late summer and early fall.

The **Golf Outing Committee** is responsible for setting up and taking down Hole Sponsor signs and for the beverage distribution system during the Spring and Summer Golf Outings. This committee is not recommended for those who want to play.

The **Membership & Public Relations Committee** is responsible for recruitment and retention of members. This will be an extremely important committee as we overcome the decline in membership we've experienced in recent years. We are looking especially for young people who can help us reach out to the next generation of SCA members. The committee does not meet regularly, but has a new Leader, **Brent Beattie**, who has lots of ideas to energize us all.

The **MSU Liaison Committee** meets monthly with the University’s Planning, Design and Construction department to share information about upcoming projects. Committee members are selected from among volunteers.

The **OTC Liaison Committee** offers advice and support to the College on construction issues. At press time, this committee is on hiatus until needed.

The **Pig Roast Committee** is made up of two groups: the planning committee meets preceding the event and they assign tasks as needed to other volunteers. Then we need about 40 more volunteers to actually work during the event, traditionally held the third Thursday in July. As with the Chicken BBQ, we would like to recruit some people with lots of mobility and access to jobsites to market the event face-to-face.

The **R-XII Liaison Committee** has a similar purpose to the MSU and OTC Liaison Committees. The meetings give the School District a chance to ask questions about construction issues while sharing information about current and upcoming projects. This group meets at 7:30 am on the second Thursday of odd-numbered months at the SCA Building.

The **Safety, Health & OSHA Committee** has the goal of promoting safety awareness for all SCA members. Seminars and training sessions are outreach opportunities identified by this committee. This committee has awarded an SCA Safety Award at different times in the past. Representatives from General and Subcontractors are needed for this group, which is now looking for a new Leader.

The **Salute to Construction Coordinator** is chosen by the members of the Salute Council and is responsible for the activities involved in the annual event. Many SCA members volunteer annually to speak at Salute Career Days. Other interested volunteers may serve on the Salute Council as at-large representatives.

The **Scholarship Committee** meets at the SCA Building during the spring to select the recipients of each year’s awards through the application and interview process. This committee also helps raise funds for annual scholarships (and the SCA Scholarship endowment fund established with the Community Foundation) by serving as workers at the Springfield Contractors Association Chicken BBQ Scholarship Fundraiser.

The **Workforce Development Committee** was very active exploring ways SCA can assist in recruiting and retaining the workforce our industry expected to need. The group also works with others, such as OTC, HBA, the Missouri Career Center and the Chamber of Commerce. This group has been on hiatus while jobs have been scarce and no regular meeting day for 2014 has been established at press time.

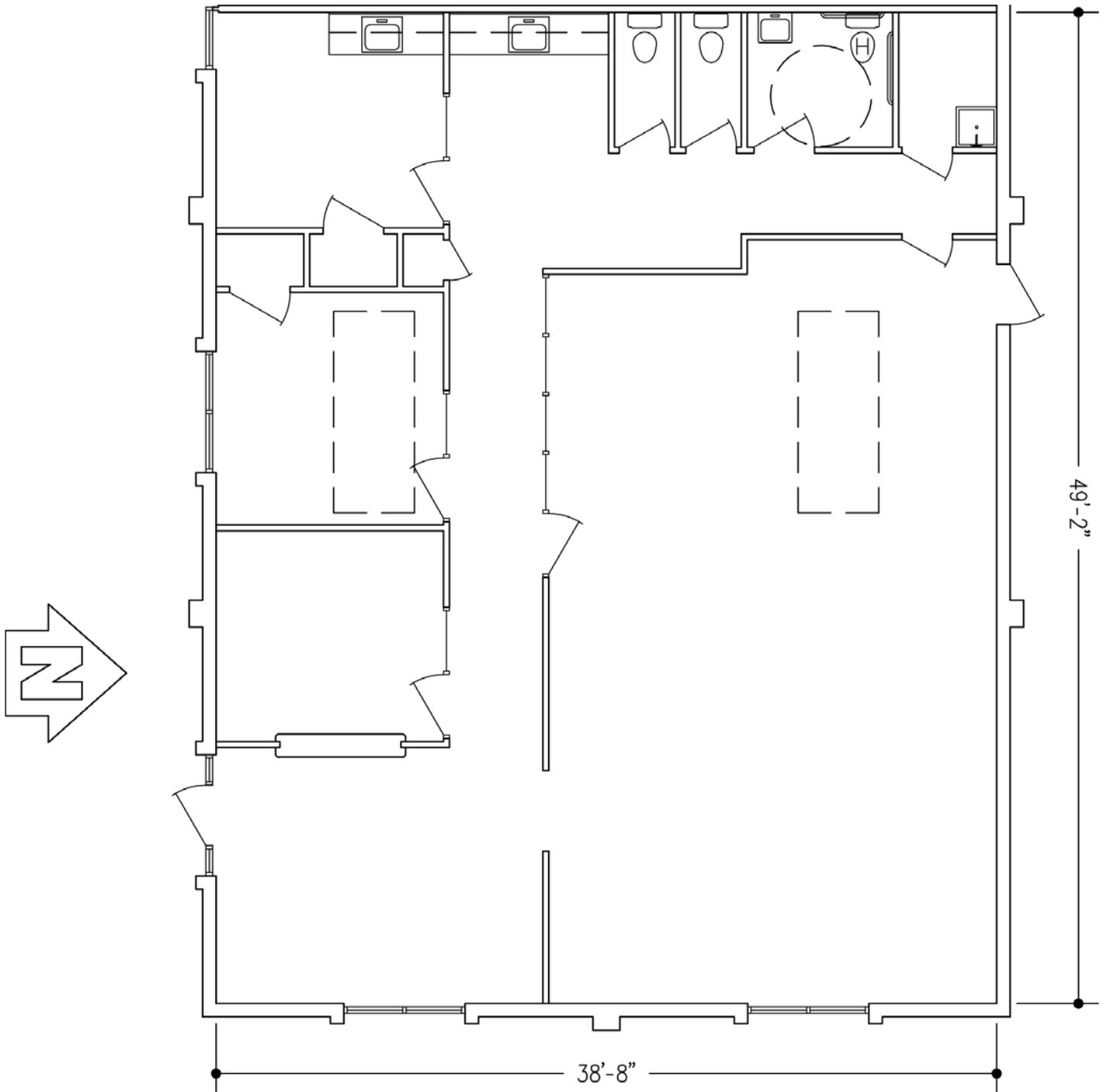

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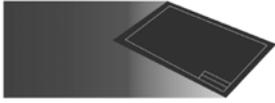
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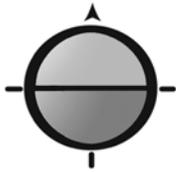
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
